

TITLE: DID JESUS HAVE TO DIE?

SCRIPTURE: Romans 5:6-11

6 While we were still weak, at the right moment, Christ died for ungodly people. 7 It isn't often that someone will die for a righteous person, though maybe someone might dare to die for a good person. 8 But God shows his love for us, because while we were still sinners Christ died for us. 9 So, now that we have been made righteous by his blood, we can be even more certain that we will be saved from God's wrath through him. 10 If we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son while we were still enemies, now that we have been reconciled, how much more certain is it that we will be saved by his life? 11 And not only that: we even take pride in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, the one through whom we now have a restored relationship with God.

SERMON DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Today we're exploring the question "Did Jesus have to die?" and talking about the theological subject of atonement. What comes to mind when you hear that word "atonement"? How have you encountered this question in church or communities of faith?
- In the sermon, we explored several different atonement theories. Which of these resonated with you?
 What impact does our belief about atonement have on our faith? What questions do you have that you would like to explore on your own or with the group?
- Re-read this week's Scripture. What does this Scripture tell us about the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection? What do we learn from what Paul has to say here?
- · How does Jesus' death help us understand God's love for us?
- One of the main points of the message is that we may not be able to find a definitive answer to the question at hand, but what we know for sure is that Jesus did die and resurrect, and that truth has the power to shape how we live our lives and relate to God. Spend some time exploring this idea as a group and share how Jesus' death and resurrection impacts the way you live out your faith.
